## How to Use Your Bible's Supplemental Material

In addition to the Bible text, there is other valuable information within your Bible that can help you interpret and understand Scripture. At the beginning of most books, or group of books, you will find an introduction. This usually brief section will provide you with information about the authorship of the book, major themes and/or structures contained within the book, and a lot of other helpful information.

Within each book you will find footnotes and Scripture cross-references printed along the bottom of each page. The footnotes provide additional information and valuable insight into the meaning of certain words or phrases in their original languages and/or certain ancient customs (which may have a different meaning in English or to our modern world). The cross-references direct you to other verses in Scripture that are similar, refer to the same thing, quote each other, or are helpful in interpretation. This information is solid exegetical (interpretive) work done by and generally agreed upon by many scholars.

Every time you see an obelisk (†) in the Bible text, you will find a corresponding footnote labeled with the same chapter and verse numbers at the bottom of the page. Every time you see an asterisk (\*) in the Bible text, you will find a corresponding cross-reference labeled with the same chapter and verse numbers at the bottom of the page. The cross-references direct you to similar Scripture passages.

Other versions of the Bible may use an asterisk (\*) instead of an obelisk to indicate a corresponding footnote and small letters (a,b,c...) to indicate a corresponding cross-reference. Regardless of the marking, the meaning is the same.
