

## The Annunciation of the Lord

Marian Feast Day

The angel explained that the Holy Spirit would come upon her, and the power of the Most High God would overshadow her, so that the son she was to have would be the Son of God. He also told her that her cousin Elizabeth, who was too old to have children, would also give birth to a baby boy, because nothing was impossible for God.
