Lesson Plan

Horton Hears a Who! REFLECTION

Objective: To identify the character virtues in "Horton Hears a Who!"; to recognize the defenseless members of our society and understand our role in speaking up for them; to reflect on an experience our parents had in defending someone who could not stand up for themselves

Show the movie "Horton Hears a Who!". Instruct students to make brief character profile notes as they are watching. Ask students to complete the Reflection WORKSHEET w/Parent Reflection. Break students up into small groups and have them share their responses. Each group will have a spokesperson who will share with the class some of the group responses.
